

Year 7 are currently studying an enquiry based around how a historian uses evidence to make judgements about the past, with a specific focus on the Tudors. Pupils have analysed portraits from the Tudor period and have become skilled at spotting elements of propaganda within the paintings. Monarchs such as Henry VIII needed to use portraits to convince their subjects that they were powerful and in control. The picture below shows two pupils standing next to a life-size portrait of Henry VIII. Notice how Henry's stance, size, clothing and jewellery have been used to convey his status and importance.

Year 8 have been learning about the Victorian attitude towards public health in the 19th century. John Snow was a successful London doctor who believed in contagion (that disease was passed from person to person). He traced the






Joseph Bazalgette was an engineer was asked to design a sewer system to stop all of London's waste being dumped in the River Thames. Bazalgette hosed in Sewers inside the London embankment so that the main area of London did not need to be dug up. The project was finished in 1870 and cost £1 billion in today's money.

Year 10 have become increasingly confident in writing sophisticated answers to practice exam questions. Pupils were asked to consider the following question: How far do you agree that the late arrival of the Danes was the main reason for the failure of the Revolt of the Earls? This question encouraged pupils to construct a balanced answer followed by an overall judgement. Extracts from some of their responses can be seen below:







# Yr 8 gaining Geographical skills



Within the Geography curriculum, pupils have to master a range of skills that allow them to interpret the world around us. This may include using and interpreting choropleth maps, climate graphs and satellite imaging, to name a few. Our current Year 8 topic of glaciation has allowed pupils to master their field sketch skills with annotations. We encourage our pupils to annotate as opposed to label, as it gives the reader a more detailed appreciation and understanding of some of the features drawn. ## **GCSE** Geography

Our year 11s have completed the first of 3 examinations for their GCSE. We have arranged a number of revision evenings over the past few weeks which have enabled pupils to gain revision strategies and gap any misconceptions. 
Keep up the fantastic effort—our next exams are on the 5th June, which is the Human Geography paper and the 14th June which is the Pre-release, field work and skills paper.




## Lego club



## 4Skills - Channel 4 Work Experience Programme

Lord Derby Academy has teamed up with Channel 4 '4Skills Work Experience Programme' in order to be able to **offer all pupils aged 14 and over** who are interested in the Creative Arts Industry, the opportunity to complete an online, accredited work experience programme. This will includes 3 essential modules (2 hours each) and the option to complete a further 5 modules resulting in an accredited programme that provides a certificate that our pupils can then add to their CV when applying to college, an apprenticeship or to a workplace. Core modules include *What is The Creative Industry? Creative Personas and Employability*.

There are far more opportunities within the TV and Broadcasting industry than meets the eye. The actors and presenters are the people we see on the screen, but there is so much that goes into getting them there. For example, it's someone's job to come up with a show idea, someone else needs to manage the production budget, another person needs to create all of the costumes and sets - and what about making sure people actually tune in?
